Floods and Landslides in Chittagong and Cox's Bazar

21st September 2023

Highlights

- Since 5th August 2023, continuous monsoon rains have affected Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Rangamati, and Bandarban in Bangladesh. 1.3 million people including 630,000 women and 480,000 children (0-18 years old) are affected and 600,000 people need humanitarian services in four districts (Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Rangamati, and Bandarban), with 51 deaths reported¹.
- In Cox's Bazar, approximately 538,373 people (including 25,533 in Rohingya camps and 185,200 children) were exposed after the floods and landslides, while nearly 85,500 people (3,500 children and 3,974 Rohingya refugees) were displaced and sheltered in temporary flood shelters².
- MUAC screening, SAM identification and inpatient management has been strengthened in targeted SAM units, with a total of 18,527 U5 children screened, and 26 SAM children admitted for treatment in three flood-affected districts.
- In Cox's Bazar host communities, 134 latrines and 78 handwashing devices have been installed. 429 tube wells, 1 tap stand, 2308 latrines and 1,222 handwashing devices have been repaired. 235 water infrastructures have been disinfected and 15,100 aqua tabs have been distributed.
- In the host communities, 1,005 women (including women-headed families with 63 persons with disabilities) have received BDT 6,000 as an unconditional multi-purpose cash grant (aligned to the Cash Working Group guideline) under our Humanitarian Cash Transfer Programme.
- A total of 2,850 Family kits and dignity kits were distributed to four affected districts (Bandarban, Chattogram, Rangamati, and Cox's Bazar) that will benefit up to 2,850 households. RCO launched an HRP, seeking up to \$30m towards recovery for the survivors of the floods in Chattogram Division.
- \$1.5m grant for WASH has been approved by CERF for the flood response.
- However, critical funding gaps across all sectors are still present, with a HAC funding gap of US60.5 M (35% per cent) restricting UNICEF's ability to meet the priority needs of girls, women, and persons with disabilities.

Humanitarian Situation and Needs³

The Chattogram Division is grappling with the impact of devastating flash floods that have left thousands without essential provisions like food, clean water, functional latrines, health care and electricity. Since 5th August 2023, continuous monsoon rains have affected Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Rangamati, and Bandarban in Bangladesh. Heavy rainfall, ranging from 44 to 89 mm, led to flash floods and landslides in the Hill Tracts, especially in Bandarban Town and nearby areas. **1.3 million people including 630,000 women and 480,000 children (0-19 years old) are affected while 600,000 people need humanitarian assistance** in four districts (Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Rangamati, and Bandarban). 51 deaths were reported¹.

38 out of the division's 51 Upazilas were submerged, leading to significant destruction in Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Rangamati, and Bandarban. Major rivers in the region were overflowing, crippling major transport routes, and resulting in the damage of up to 410 kilometres of roads. Recovery efforts have now begun and addressing the basic requirements of the affected people but also infrastructure and supplies.

Chittagong (Bandarban, Rangamati, Chattogram)

Chattogram District: A total of 843,505 people (401,959 women, 292,214 children including 7,013 CAwD⁴)⁵ have been affected by the flash floods and landslides in Chattogram City and 15 Upazilas (sub-districts) of Chattogram District, with Chandanaise, Satkania, and Lohagara Upazilas severely affected.⁵ A total of 28,070 houses were damaged, 18,885 partially and 9,185 houses fully damaged. The District Administration reported 16 deaths including 1 child.

Bandarban District: 62,000 people (23,677 women, 13,680 children including 589 CAwD)⁵ have been impacted by the flashfloods and landslides in over 7 Upazilas. 6,579 houses have been damaged (5,173 partially damaged and 1,406 fully damaged). 108 para-centers have been destroyed. 10 people died due to landslides and drowning, while 4 others were injured. Currently 396 people are living in shelters.

Rangamati District: 30,254 people (8,954 female and 11,981 children including 161 CAwD) from 8,425 households located in 29 unions of 7 Upazilas and Rangamati Municipality are

affected. Five deaths were reported, 4 of them children.⁶ The Director of Primary Education (DPE) reported that 71 Primary schools were damaged partially while the SSS CHT management reported 40 Para-centers being damaged. Overall, the flood situation is improving though the affected communities are yet to recover from their losses.

Khagrachari District: **15,000 people (4,439 women, 5,940 children)** were affected in Khagrachari District. The situation in Khagrachari has gradually improved.

UNICEF Response

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

- With UNICEF support, 2,000 hygiene kit packages (each containing 15 items)
 have been distributed in the flood affected areas in Satkania under Chattogram
 district through the leadership of the Department of Public Health Engineering
 (DPHE). 1,000 kits distribution is in progress. This initiative will benefit up to 13,500
 beneficiaries, specifically targeting the well-being of women and adolescent girls.
- With UNICEF support, construction of **100 climate resilient sanitary toilets** with disability-friendly design is in progress in Bandarban and Rangamati districts and will benefit an estimated **4,500 people**.

Nutrition

- MUAC screening, SAM identification and inpatient management has been strengthened in targeted SAM units, with a total of 18,527 U5 children screened, and 26 SAM children admitted for treatment in three flood affected districts.
- 17,366 U5 children and caregivers received nutrition services including IYCF counselling at IMCI-N corners in four districts Bandarban, Rangamati, Khagrachari and Chattogram.
- UNICEF maintained coordination with partners and UN agencies for provision of nutrition services in Chattogram City Corporation areas and facilitated a coordination meeting with NGO partners working in the Chattogram City Corporation.

Child Protection

- With UNICEF support and in partnership with the Department of Social Services (DSS), the list of vulnerable children and affected families in need has been finalized and a total of 2,850 Family kits and dignity kits were distributed to four affected districts (Bandarban, Chattogram, Rangamati, and Cox's Bazar) that will benefit the 2,850 households. In addition, more than 4,000 kits (2,000 Dignity; 2,000 Family) are planned for distribution in the affected districts.
- Child Protection Section facilitated more than 3,020 information sessions (including information on how to seek help, drowning and dengue prevention), and supported referral of vulnerable children for multi-sectoral services identified through the Child Protection Community Hubs in floods-affected locations and through the Child Helpline (CHL) 1098 (1,167 calls were related to information seeking). More than 103,300 (56,050 women, 403 children with disabilities) children and community members were reached with critical information and services such as sporting events and hub activities via MoWCA and MoYS outreaches.
- To reach the remotest areas affected by the floods in the Hill Tracks, the DSS (with support from UNICEF) is finalizing
 the recruitment processes for more than 10 new social workers in addition to the 16 Social Workers earlier
 deployed. In addition, 4 Social Work Consultants for Child protection have been deployed to support Child
 Protection response work.
- The DSS with UNICEF support, did case follow-up of the children in affected areas and provided psychosocial support, reaching more than 3,050 beneficiaries (1,840 women, 94 people with disabilities).
- In collaboration with DSS, and MoWCA more than 24,700 (16,248 women, 161 children with disability) women, girls, and boys were reached with GBV risk mitigation and prevention messaging, child marriage, child trafficking, and child labor.

Health

- UNICEF is providing technical support to DGHS to revive maternal, child and newborn services including regular
 coordination of routine expanded program on immunization (EPI) sessions as per the micro-plan and intensify the
 immunization programme to ensure that children who missed their immunizations are reached.
- Post flood monitoring visits were conducted to Satkania Upazilla Health Complex and Lama Upazilla Health Complex in Chattogram. Damage to health facility infrastructure (eg, WASH facilities), facility registers, equipment (e.g., generator set, vaccine fridge and freezer) and supplies (e.g., vaccine syringes) were recorded and health facility managers have initiated renovation works while new registers have been supplied by the District Health Department. However, provision of WASH facilities and equipment repairs is urgently required.

Education

1,200 Education in Emergencies (EIE) kits are ready to be distributed to 198 Government Primary Schools (GPS) in most affected schools in Rangamati, Bandarban and Chattogram. UNICEF is working together with DPE and the DPEO to finalize the school list to enable distribution to commence.

- Education Section designed critical activities to ensure return to normalcy for affected children. These included
 conducting a survey to identify disaster-affected schools and learners, distribution of education supportive materials for
 early learning centers, mobilizing and raising awareness among the community to send children back to school in
 collaboration with SBC, and technical and operational support for quality implementation and coordination.
- A survey tool is being developed to gather information that would enable the Sector to understand the post disaster education needs in schools for further support.
- Basic learning materials have been procured and are ready for distribution to the **150 Para Center's** for children aged 3 to 5 to continue their education in Para Centers.

Social and Behavior Change (SBC)

- SBC developed a plan for flood response in consultation with partners and partner staff who were oriented on SBC and AAP activities and implementation modalities.
- Lifesaving behaviors and practices have been shared with children and their families through community consultations in **14 camps**.

Cox's Bazar

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

- In the host communities, 134 latrines and 78 handwashing devices have been installed. 429 tube wells, 1 tap stand, 2308 latrines and 1,222 handwashing devices have been repaired. In addition, 235 water facilities have been disinfected and 15,100 agua tabs distributed during the response.
- 1000 kits were distributed among families in two of the most affected Upazilas in collaboration with Upazila Administration and LGIs in Pekua, benefiting 1,900 families.
- WASH interventions are planned to benefit approximately **150,000 people (69,450 children and 71,100 women)** to cope with the flood devastation and enable them access to safe water, sanitation and hygiene practices.

Child Protection

• Regular Child Protection activities are continuing for children, women and girls as per the previous sitrep.

Nutrition

- In the host communities, 1,005 women (including women-headed families with 63 persons with disabilities) have received BDT 6,000 as unconditional multi-purpose cash grant (aligned to the Cash Working Group guideline) under our Humanitarian Cash Transfer Programme to support floods affected families.⁷
- A post-distribution monitoring (PDM) is planned for the end of October 2023 to obtain detailed information on how the cash grant benefited the affected families in recovering from the post-flood situation.

Humanitarian Coordination and Leadership

UNICEF's Chattogram Field Office is in regular contact and coordination with Government Departments to monitor the situation. UNICEF met with the Deputy Commissioner of Bandarban, Deputy Commissioner of Rangamati, the Chairman of the Bandarban Hill District Council (BHDC), the Chairman of Rangamati Hill District Council, Chairman of Chittagong Hill Tracts Development Boardand the Secretary of the Ministry of Chittagong Hill Tracts Affairs (MoCHTA) to update the UNICEF response plan with other UN agencies (UNDP, UNFPA, WFP). UNICEF conducted a joint visit with Bandarban Hill District Council Chairman to flood affected communities and Para centers and advocated for the renovation of 108 damaged para centres in Bandarban. Moreover, UNICEF participated in a UN coordination meeting in Chattogram to discuss coordination and a multi-sectoral flood response. Meetings of the Health Coordination meetings are held on weekly basis from 1st week of September 2023 to date. The Deputy Commissioner's office finalized the D-form and share it with the DRR Working Group of Cox's Bazar. UNICEF Field Office Teams are in regular contact with the sectoral focal points, the Office of The Refugee Relief and Repatriation (RRRC) and Deputy Commissioner's office as well as the Civil Surgeon's office and the Department of Public Health and Engineering (DPHE) and sharing relevant information. UNICEF is leading the WASH and Nutrition Clusters and Child Protection sub-sector as well as being the co-lead of the Education Sector. A meeting of Emergency Preparedness and Response Working Group held on 14th September and post flood situation has been

discussed where UNICEF is an active member. The Access Working Group (AWG) was held on 12th September where post-flood access challenges and mitigation measures were discussed. The Resident Coordinator's Office has launched a Humanitarian Response Plan (August 2023-January 2024) for the floods repose.

Funding Situation

In September 2023, UNICEF Bangladesh Country Office received generous contribution of US\$ 505,000 from the Danish Government as part of Thematic Humanitarian support for the dengue and flood response in Bangladesh. A \$1.5m CERF grant for water and sanitation response in Chattogram and Cox's Bazar floods emergency has been approved. The Norwegian Government has granted \$900,000 towards the dengue response and, in addition, \$199,000 has been provided by EMOPS towards the dengue response in Bangladesh. However, critical funding gaps in the UNICEF Bangladesh Country Office HAC 2023 across all sectors restricted UNICEF's ability to meet the priority needs of girls, women, and people with disabilities during the flooding. Flexible donor funding is crucial to provide essential support to flood-affected communities in the southeast of Bangladesh. The current funding status is shown below:
